New Officers, Annual Budget On June's Congregational Agenda

Members of Tikvat Israel will elect a new president and other officers at a congregational meeting at 10 a.m. on Sunday, June 25, in the sanctuary.

In addition to the election of all seven officer positions, four board of director slots also will be on the ballot.

The new officers and board members will serve two-year terms through June 30, 2025. They will be installed by the clergy on the *bimah* at *Shabbat* services on July 8.

The synagogue's board also will be seeking the congregation's approval of the annual operating budget for 2023-24. It figures to call for about \$1.3 million in spending on operations, programs and staff salaries between July 1 and next June 30.

A quorum of congregants is required for the budget vote and election to take place.

Warren Berger, who is completing a two-year stint as president following two years as co-president, is expected to deliver a state of the synagogue report. Treasurer Stuart Lempert will present the state of the synagogue's finances and answer questions.

Jim Perlmutter, as the immediate past president, serves as chair of the nominations committee, which is responsible for presenting a slate of candidates to fill the berths being vacated.

Three trustee positions for the TI Fund for the Future also will be up for election. FFF trustees serve three-year terms.

The FFF will hold its annual public meeting on Monday, May 22, at 8:15 p.m. using TI's regular Zoom link. This meeting is open to all congregants.

RABBI'S CORNER

Reflecting on 25 Years in the Rabbinate

On Thursday, May 4th, I will travel to New York City to mark the 25th anniversary of my rabbinic ordination. I look forward to seeing friends and colleagues, but this is not merely a reunion. For its alumni who have served the Jewish community for 25 years, Hebrew Union College–Jewish Institute of Religion bestows a Doctor of Divinity degree, *honoris causa*, colloquially

known as a DD-or "didn't die."

When I was a 28-year-old rabbinical student, I didn't appreciate its value. And while I may still think of myself as being young, a look in the mirror tells a different story. Reflecting on the past 25 years in the rabbinate, I realize that I have learned more than I realized. Here are 25 lessons, in no particular order:

- **25**. We can never be certain of the direction in which life will take us. I thought I would spend my career with Hillel or be a camp director, but accidentally discovered a love of working in the synagogue.
- **24**. Certainty is overrated. As a student, I thought it was important to have definite answers to life's big questions. Experience has taught me to embrace the beauty of the unknowable.
- **23**. I believed then—and still believe—that there are absolute truths. But arguing over those truths can be a fool's errand, and I have developed the humility to recognize that I may not have it right.
- **22.** I have learned the meaning of the rabbinic dictum "o' chevruta o' metuta" (loosely translated as "give me friendship or give me death"). We are neither rocks nor islands. Our relationships are not merely the enjoyment of life, they are the essence of it.
- **21**. Don't allow the all-consuming nature of a job to consume you. There is a reason *Pirkei Avot* teaches us that it is not incumbent upon us to complete the work.
- **20**. *Genesis*' mythological account of all humanity descending from one couple can be backed up through biology, according to Yuval Harari. Therefore, the differences between humans are much more a sociological construct than innate.
- 19. Understanding modern brain science is essential to comprehending human behavior and what makes us tick. Used correctly, it can help us become more compassionate towards people who are different from us.
- **18**. Process matters. It's not enough for leaders to think they know the best path forward; they must allow everyone to consider all the options and join in reaching the conclusion.
- 17. Pay attention to the details; an unreturned phone call or email can cause a great deal of pain.
- 16. Jewish education succeeds when it challenges people to think deeply, not when it is watered down to the lowest common denominator.
- 15. Whether it's informing a family member of a death or dismissing an employee, it is best to deliver bad news quickly, directly and in person.

- 14. We need to strive continually to balance the need for clear boundaries defining the Jewish community with efforts to lower the barriers for those who want to join us.
- **13**. We are good; we are flawed; we are the children of an imperfect God.
- **12**. It's equally important to teach our children well and to listen to them with deep respect and sincerity.
- 11. Many factors influence a child's Jewish identity. From my experience, formal education is important, but camp has a deeper impact. Joyful family life and consistency between what parents do and say at home matters most of all.
- **10.** Presenting synagogue leadership positions and fundraising opportunities as an avenue to engage people in doing *mitzvot*, rather than as a burden, is key to success.
- **9.** Judaism and religion do not contradict science or rationality; they address the aspects of the universe that defy rationality and connect us to the mysterious forces that guide it.
- **8**. It's important to understand the differences between prayer, *davening*, and worship, and to recognize which one(s) you are trying to achieve in any given moment.
- 7. We must build greater interfaith connections and deepen our cultural awareness. We must also recognize and call out all antisemitism and remember that we face real and dangerous enemies.
- **6**. The best Jewish rituals are like jazz—they have a set structure that everyone knows and understands, but which is loose enough to create moments of spontaneity. And when that happens, it is magical.
- **5**. I've never regretted the times I've pushed myself outside of my comfort zone. I often regret times when I haven't.
- **4.** Regardless of the facade they show to the world, almost every family has deep *tzauris* (difficulties) that they may not share, even with their closest friends.
- **3.** The Jewish people survived 2,000 years without a homeland and if necessary—God forbid—we could do it again. However, we are a much stronger people with the State of Israel, and must work to defend and protect it, even in challenging times.
- **2**. Being Jewish matters. Judaism and the Jewish people continue to impact the world in ways that extend far beyond our numbers and that defy all logic.
- **1**. I love being a rabbi and, more specifically, I love being **your** rabbi. Throughout the last 25 years, I've had amazing opportunities to learn and to teach, to celebrate and to mourn, to build coalitions and to stand up for what Judaism teaches.

Most importantly, thank you for being my partner as we work together to make this community the best it can be.

Reliving Memorable TI Concerts Through New Video Collection

Ever yearn to watch a re-run of some of those memorable Cantor's Concerts and other cultural events presented at Tikvat Israel over the years? Now you can.

A YouTube playlist, known as @ti, featuring video highlights of past concert performances at TI, has been curated by congregant Jules Asher. The video recordings date as far back as the mid-1990s. Asher shot and edited most of the footage over the years, although the recent pandemic era videos are recordings of livestreams produced by RCI Systems that have been archived on Rabbi Marc Israel's YouTube channel.

The synagogue's historical videos, currently totaling 44, are listed in reverse chronological order. They range from this year's Cantor's Concert featuring Nefesh Mountain to the 1994 staging of "The Dybbuk."

Notable offerings from the nearly 30-year collection include the TI performances by Neshama Carlebach, the Seth

Kibel Band, the Billy Jonas Band and Rak Shalom. Many videos feature Cantor Rochelle Helzner performing a few numbers with the guest talent, including her sister Robyn and her father Manny.

Two particular videos, dating back a decade, may be of keen interest to Tikvat Israel members:

- "Tales of the Unleavened," a series of entertaining stories pegged to Passover and recorded in 2014, including a standup by TI's late Shelly Goldin; and
- "Shiru," Cantor Helzner's virtual duet with herself, performed as part of the 2012 "Rav Todot" event honoring retiring Rabbi Howard Gorin.

Some of the concert videos were previously accessible on Google Drive. But the new YouTube playlist includes a few heretofore unreleased concert videos, along with several selected individual songs broken out as more user-friendly (and shorter) separate videos. The video descriptions accompanying several of the full concert videos include links to scanned versions of the original printed concert programs.

Capital Campaign Nears Milestone Goal, **Enabling Completion of First Projects**

Wow, what a congregation! In four short months, our members stepped up with pledges that put our Capital Campaign close to its \$600,000 goal. Nearly 90 families have generously committed to help us keep our facilities fully operational, safe and secure.

With the funds already received, we already have replaced the main sanctuary HVAC system and two HVAC systems in the social hall, and completed the construction for replacement of the kitchen door and frame. Several large dead trees that posed a risk to the building have been removed.

Planning is underway for our next project: repair of the school wing elevator to conform to the county code. Additional repairs and replacements will be scheduled as funds become available.

Even as the campaign has drawn almost \$525,000 in pledges, members who have not yet made a commitment are urged to join their fellow congregants in making the Capital Campaign a complete success. In addition, we hope those who have already made their pledges might consider increasing their donations. Just a little bit more will ensure we reach our ultimate goal of \$600,000.

The Capital Campaign comprises six donation categories: Tzadek \$36,000 and up; Visionary \$18,000; Builder \$12,000; Leader \$6,000; Defender \$3,000; and Advocate \$1,800. Pledges can be paid in installments over a one-, two- or three-year period. Earlier payment of the full amount, however, would be especially helpful to allow completion of the work as soon as possible.

of your activity idea and what resources you might need to pull it off. Once completed, you submit the form to the vice president for programming (Step C), and the idea will be vetted with the committee chair or the vice president with oversight.

Tikvat Israel is a special place with a mission to engage, embrace, inspire and empower our Jewish community. You don't have to be a *macher* or a board member to see your activity idea become reality.

For example, Tikvat Israel U, which just completed its fifth year, started as a proposal from the Adult Education Committee to showcase members' talents to other members. *Chanukkah* in the Hood, started as a "what if" idea — what if we staged *chanukkiah* lighting outdoors during the festival of lights in the various neighborhoods where TI members live?

BIKE COLLECTION EVENT SET FOR TI JUNE 4



Tikvat Israel will host a used bicycle collection event in the parking lot from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Sunday, June 4, in cooperation with Bikes for the World.

Bikes are donated, domestically and internationally, mostly to Africa, Central America and South Asia. You can read about the impact of the program at *bikesfortheworld.org*.

The TI organizers seek the following:

- Any serviceable complete (or nearly complete) bicycle, adult or children's, accompanied by a suggested minimum \$10-per-bike donation to defray a share of the costs. Flat tires or a missing seat or pedal do not matter. Also accepted are tandems, recumbents, adult tricycles and trail-a-bikes. Especially welcome are children's bikes because they are used to get children to school, and servicing of kids' bikes generates mechanic employment overseas.
- **Usable bicycle spare parts and components,** including tubes, tires, wheels, chains, pedals, saddles, cables and mountain bike handlebars (but not "drop" handlebars).
- **Usable bicycle accessories,** including helmets, pumps, locks, gloves, chains (for locks), bicycle books and manuals, and hand tools, including general tools such as wrenches and screw drivers.

Egg-shakers and other percussion instruments are provided for use by participants throughout the *minyan*.

At our first *minyan*, some folks dropped in and out throughout the hour and a half, while others stayed for the entire time. Melissa Apter described the *minyan* as "lots of camp-style singing, and a good text discussion," and said she hopes to attend the next session.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER Passover, Family and Community

As I write this article at Passover, I am reminded of how important family is in Judaism. Our year has Jewish holidays with different focuses, but most of them include family visits and, of course — **food**! I hope you all had as wonderful a holiday as I did.

It is interesting to watch young children as they start to learn about the holidays (in an age-appropriate way). My three-year-old granddaughter is fascinated by the story of Passover, and we have read many books about it to her. She has seen the "Prince of Egypt" movie many times (with some fast forwarding through scary parts and some corrections where it differs from the story that we tell). She earnestly explains to us that Moses is the hero who saved everyone (with God's help) and that Pharaoh is "not nice."

I was also reminded of family when I saw the outpouring of love at the funeral and *shiva* for Bonnie Cowan, *z"l*. Bonnie was extraordinary in her ability to connect with people from many different avenues. People—who were like family—came to honor her life from all of Bonnie's connections, such as her homebirthing community, and from various eras of Beth Tikva /Tikvat Israel. I know that the TI community will support the family in all their needs. We were also fortunate to participate in the celebration of the *brit milah* of Bonnie and Elliot's new grandson, the son of Marnina and Seth. May we all continue to support each other during the life-cycle events of our friends and community.

Our synagogue family is not just our members. It includes clergy and our staff. Together, we make a holy community. Please also step up (without even being asked) to fill in for a person who had a role but did not show up (for example) because they were sick. That's what family does.

Finally, I want to remind everyone that we will have our annual congregational meeting the morning of Sunday, June 25th. As usual, there will be a vote on next year's budget. My favorite part (this year) will be the election of TI board officers and directors, and of trustees for the Fund for the Future. Also, we expect to propose a new dues model with some necessary bylaw changes (if they are first approved by the Board). FUND FOR THE FUTURE Planned Giving and Tikvat Israel

Estate planning, including planned giving, might sound like something for just wealthy people, yet the truth is estate planning is something we all need to think about. No matter how large or small our net worth may be, estate planning is a process — and a powerful tool — that ensures our assets are handed down the way we wish after we pass away. You can always make changes to the plan as your life and situation evolve over time, but it is critical to take the first step and set up an estate plan.

Several years ago, Bobbi and I realized our estate planning was inadequate. We had wills, but we decided we needed to put something in place that would address our medical needs and financial decisions while we were still living, but perhaps incapacitated, and to specifically lay out a detailed plan of our how we wanted our assets distributed upon our death. That is planned giving. We did not want to leave our legacy up to chance. We wanted to take control of our estate planning and ensure the people and causes we cared about, such as Tikvat Israel, would continue to receive our support even after our deaths.

We first contacted our financial adviser who recommended an estate planning attorney whom he thought we might want to work with. We took that advice and contacted the attorney and started the process. He said he would be pleased to work with us but that he considered his role as helping us think through the process and implement our wishes. The hard work was up to us to decide how we wanted to proceed on the medical and financial fronts, and to carefully consider how we wanted our assets to be distributed.

Obviously, these decisions differ with each individual, but the process we took for asset distribution may be something that others could find useful. We agreed that our first priority was our children and grandchildren, but we also felt strongly about leaving assets to some of the institutions and entities that we had supported and whose work we knew reflected our values.

This was a difficult task as there have been so many groups and institutions we would like to support – but we realized that if we divided our assets among too many entities, the impact of our gift would probably be diluted. We made a list of the entities that have either been a major part of our life or whose mission we felt deeply about. It was difficult to narrow the list down, but it was a valuable exercise.

Among the entities we knew had played an important part in our lives and one that we wanted to support was Tikvat Israel, either through a bequest to the synagogue in general or specifically to the Fund for the Future, whose purpose is to ensure the continuation of the synagogue and community that has played a central role in our lives. Because we don't know how much our estate will be worth after our deaths, we made our bequests as percents of our estate, realizing we could make changes at any time as our lives and thinking evolved. We revisit our plan periodically and have made some changes as our family situation changes. However, we still include the organizations and causes we cherish, including many Jewish organizations such as Tikvat Israel and Hadassah.

Jewish tradition states one of our key responsibilities is to make the world a better place for future generations. Estate planning can help each of us fulfill that responsibility.
