Board Election, Budget on Ballot at Congregational Meeting

Members of Tikvat Israel will be asked to elect five members to the synagogue's board and to weigh the merits of a spending plan for 2024-25 at a congregational meeting on Sunday, June 30.

The meeting will run from 10 a.m. to about noon in the sanctuary. It will be accessible via the *shul's* Zoom connection for those unable to be there in person, enabling them to vote on the 2025 fiscal year budget and the board candidates.

The parameters and priorities of the new operating budget will be finalized in early June

and shared with congregation members before they cast their votes on the spending proposal.

This will represent the first Tikvat Israel budget that relies on a new fiscal model with voluntary annual pledges by congregants at the core.

In terms of the board election, the incumbents completing their terms in June are Jenny Gendel, Jay P. Goldman, Monica Meyer, Abioye Mosheim Oyewole and Amy Sanders. Oyewole joined the board in February to fill the final five months of the berth

With Dues Transition, Members Will Pledge Support to Sustain TI

As Tikvat Israel approaches the end of the 2023-24 fiscal year, congregants can expect successful introduction of a new financial model that relies on voluntary annual pledges from congregants.

The congregation's Dues Transition Task Force has made great progress to ensure a smooth transition to the new model, which takes effect July 1.

The new voluntary pledge model relies on congregants (and potential congregants) receiving a clear explanation of what it costs to operate Tikvat Israel over a full year and then asking each member to make a monetary pledge. Each member's pledge will reflect a commitment to Tikvat Israel and based on their personal financial circumstances.

Members will be asked in the coming weeks to commit by early June to an amount with which they are comfortable. The new financial system eliminates the need for the annual High Holidays Appeal, the *Chai* Campaign and the mandatory building security fee. No longer will there be a need for any member to seek a dues reduction or disclose any personal financial information.

A Sustaining Amount

Individuals are expected to make their pledges based on a fuller understanding of what it costs to maintain our congregation. Our financial officers have determined a cost-per-member, or sustaining amount, that will better clarify our operating expenses. Simply, the sustaining amount is calculated on the overall operating costs for such things as staff and clergy salaries, building maintenance and utilities and programming throughout the year.

The total costs then are reduced by major expected sources of revenue (such as the proceeds of the Early Childhood Center and projected contribution from the Fund for the Future). The adjusted total cost figure is then divided by the number of expected adult members to generate the sustaining amount necessary to support the needs of Tikvat Israel. The sustaining amount for this year would have been approximately \$2,500 per adult member (\$5,000 per two-adult household); we expect it to increase for next year.

The sustaining amount is not a minimum contribution but can be used as a guidepost to help each member understand the needs of the synagogue when they determine their annual pledge.

The Model's Merits

The voluntary aspect is expected to encourage younger individuals and couples to consider joining TI without facing a financial hurdle, and will also welcome those on fixed incomes.

Everyone who fulfills a pledge will enjoy full access to the many benefits of membership, including High Holiday seats, educational opportunities, the services of our rabbi and cantor and much more. What the annual pledges will not include are tickets for the Cantor's Concert, individual contributions for *yahrzeits*, and costs for dinners and other ticketed events.

Following the recommendations of the Strategic Plan that was adopted in June 2022, TI members overwhelmingly approved the use of a new financial model to replace a tiered structure of annual dues for membership. Nearly 40 congregations around the country have successfully adopted this model, and more continue to do so each year.

Appointed by the current co-presidents, the Dues Transition Task Force was created to implement the plan. The members of the Task Force are co-chairs Warren and Arlene Berger, Betty Fishman, Spencer Lane, and Roni and Bob Silverstein. The task force immediately began working on four elements necessary to implement the change. Those were a review of the financial and budgetary implications of the new structure; how best to communicate the new dues plan to members and potential members; the impact the change will have on office functions; and any necessary changes to the synagogue's bylaws. Work on each of these areas has been ongoing.

What's Next

All current members can expect a personalized letter and fiscal statement showing the three-year average of what that member (or member household) has paid to Tikvat Israel for dues, Chai Campaign, High Holiday Appeal and security fees. It will not include contributions to the Capital Campaign, though we hope

that support will be considered when each member or member household calculates their annual pledge of support for the coming year.

The mailing to each congregant will include a form on which to indicate whether to voluntarily commit to the same level of support as the average over the last three years or to increase or decrease support based on personal circumstances. The form will enable members to request an optional meeting with a task force member to gain a better understanding of the new financial model as they determine an appropriate pledge amount. We ask that the completed forms be returned to the synagogue office by June 3.

Hopefully, Warren Berger's lengthy article in the March-April issue of the *Bulletin*, and the information in this issue, have provided each member with a full yet concise explanation of the voluntary pledge model. It is a program that will carry Tikvat Israel strongly into the future through its openness and responsiveness to the needs of its members.

Voluntary Pledge Commitment in a Nutshell

This new model is a simple and practical annual commitment that entrusts congregants to sustain Tikvat Israel Congregation each year.

In essence, your pledge will replace the following items from previous years:

- Membership dues and fees (notably, the annual security fee);
- Chai Campaign contributions (which no longer will be conducted as a separate fund-raising program); and
- High Holiday/Kol Nidre Appeal pledges.

Your pledge will not include the miscellaneous donations you may give throughout the year, such as cantor concert donations, *yahrzeit* donations, donations to the *kiddush* fund or another donor fund in honor of an individual, and ticketed dinners.

To sustain our facilities, programs, staff and services in 2024-25, Tikvat Israel's leadership estimates it will cost more than \$2,500 (which would have been the amount for this year) per adult member. This is an estimate as the budget for next year has not been finalized. Members will receive more details when the budget and the actual *sustaining amount* are available in the next few weeks. We will not be setting your required financial contribution at the sustaining amount. You will be billed only what you pledge.

Our hope is each member family will commit to an annual financial contribution that reflects their unique situation and the value they affix to being a member, so that together we will be able to raise the amount of funds needed to meet Tikvat Israel's needs next year and to position our synagogue to be financially strong in the future.

RABBI'S CORNER Embracing the Unknown

As with much of life, this *Bulletin* operates on its own schedule, independent of anything else that is happening. Editors Jay Goldman and Betty Fishman and the other volunteers who work on it are committed to putting together a quality product each issue. This requires time for editing, layout, proofing, production and mailing to ensure it arrives

in your mailbox on or just before the first day of the month. Therefore, articles are due a full month ahead of the publication date.

Most of the time, this is not difficult – there is enough predictability to our programmatic and holiday calendars to find a topic that can be written in advance and still feel fresh and relevant when you receive it.

This issue is different for me. I had to submit this column before taking my month-long sabbatical, knowing it will arrive just before I return. Therefore, I was left in the strange position of trying to share an experience that has not yet occurred. This is the first time I've had a sabbatical, and the first time I've spent a month living (and not touring) in Israel in 30 years. Not only is the experience new, but the circumstances in Israel when I'm writing this may not look at all like what they will be when I return.

God willing, there may be a cease-fire agreement and all the hostages will be returned. Or Israel may be deeply mired in an operation in Rafah to root out Hamas and feeling further isolated from the world. The production calendar of the *Bulletin* makes it impossible for me to share what I most want to say to you at this moment.

While trying to work through this quandary, I realized the feeling that the calendar is off-kilter is a quintessential part of the Jewish experience. We usually express it by talking about whether the holidays are "early" or "late" this year. I've rarely heard anyone say that *Rosh Hashanah* is "on time." And because this is a leap year, you are receiving this issue just as *Pesach* concluded – something we don't normally associate with the beginning of May.

Ironically, despite this year's observances of *Yom HaZikaron* and *Yom Ha'atzmaut* falling on the exact same day in both the Jewish and the secular calendar – May 14 and the 6th of *Iyar* – many of us may feel our observance of these days is even more out-of-sync with our neighbors than usual. While we cannot know what the situation will be on the ground, we can be certain this year's commemoration may be the most difficult, and perhaps most important, of Israel's existence.

In the past year, nearly 2,000 Israelis were killed by terrorists or in combat. To put this number in context, it is the equivalent of 82,500 Americans, in terms of percentage of the population. For every family in Israel, this *Yom HaZikaron* will feature a greater sense of personal loss than ever before.

At the same time, the myriad of issues that Israel faces – lack of faith in the government, a broken sense of trust in the ability of the IDF and intelligence to protect its citizens, bitter fights resuming between the religious and secular communities over mandatory military service, and the continued debates over the role of the judiciary – make it more difficult to achieve the sense of unity and celebration associated with *Yom HaAtzmaut*. These are not mere political issues but existential issues about the future of the State of Israel. We don't know how the current situation will impact the *Yom HaAtzmaut* celebrations, but we know it will be different.

As we approach these coming days, many of us will feel a desire to express solidarity with Israel, but also be concerned about feeling more isolated from neighbors who cannot understand our connection. We will want to celebrate the resilience of the Jewish people, while taking time to mourn the loss of life and the loss of faith. And some of us may not wish to call attention to these days at all because our own feelings are so muddled at this moment.

I cannot tell you the best way for us to commemorate *Yom HaZikaron* and *Yom HaAtzmaut*. Somehow, I think that even if I had written this column the day before these commemorations, I still would not be certain. But I know it will be important to come together, to acknowledge our many (and perhaps contradictory) feelings and to allow space for the diversity of opinions that exists in our community, trusting that each of us is coming from a place of deep love and deep pain. If we can achieve these goals, I have confidence that whatever we do, we will get it "right."

As we reminded ourselves at our recent *seders*, we cannot allow the fear of the unknown to prevent us from moving forward. The Israelites did not know the sea would split when they began to walk into the water. David Ben Gurion and the founders of the state did not know if they would succeed in establishing a State of Israel when they declared its independence on May 14, 1948. But they knew the alternative – not to act – would be far worse. Regardless of whether we feel prepared for a particular moment, we must do the best we can with the information we have, and pray the rest will be OK.

I hope you will join in our commemoration of the Israel *Yamim* this month, in whatever form they may take. And I look forward to sharing my experience with you at the appropriate time. More details to follow.

There's a Space for You at the Leadership Table

Springtime for the Jewish people is a time of joy. The season opens with the recitation of the *Megillah* as we learn once again about the wisdom and valor of Queen Esther. We then move to *Pesach* where we recite the story of the Exodus around our *seder* tables. The Exodus story, of course, culminates with the wonder of *Shavuot* as we contemplate the gift of *Torah* that is our people's legacy. We are, after all, the People of the Book.

Threaded through all these biblical stories are lessons in leadership. Esther, an orphan who was raised far from the city, rose up to lead, with King Ahasueras, a vast kingdom. And then there is Moses, who started life in the palace of the Pharoah but came to be the greatest leader the world has ever seen, bringing his people out of the wilderness to Israel and bringing the Ten Commandments to the Jews.

Along the way we hear about lesser leaders such as King Saul, who we read

about during *Purim* services. King Saul famously defied G-d. When commanded to kill all the Amalekites and their livestock, he spared the life of the Amalekite king and took the tribe's best livestock, apparently for himself.

What lessons can we learn from all these leaders?

From Esther, we learn the value of bravery. We see her taking up a cause that appears helpless, and showing steely resolve in reaching her goal to protect her people. Queen Esther did not know how her husband, the king, would respond to her dinner invitation much less how her denunciation of the most powerful non-royal man in Persia would go.

Similarly, Moses took on the role of leading his people at a time of their greatest peril—their flight from slavery to freedom. With his words and resolve, he moved the most powerful man in the world to let the Jews go, and then kept the Israelites together through their wanderings in the desert. He then fearlessly stood before G-d to receive the laws and covenant that have guided the Jewish people ever since.

The stories of these kings, queens and prophets guide us in our thinking about leadership. Leading a *shul* like Tikvat Israel is in no way like co-leading a vast kingdom like Persia or single-handedly bringing a people out of slavery. But on a much smaller scale, leading a synagogue involves elements of leadership these three figures exemplify.

From Esther, we learn to listen to the wise members of our community (like Mordechai) and take prompt action. From Moses we learn that even if we do not feel equipped, we can

implement our vision. And from Saul, we learn what to do and even more importantly what *not* to do.

Saul was a warrior who successfully led his people and was skillful in battle. But at a critical time—when he was asked by G-d why he did not completely slay his enemies and why he did take their best livestock, quite probably for himself—he blamed his soldiers. Then he lied saying that he planned to sacrifice the animals to G-d. The story of Saul teaches us that being a leader means taking responsibility and telling the truth, even when it is scary to do so.

Revising bylaws and setting up a new dues policy is hardly the stuff of nation building. But in the small world of Tikvat Israel, it involves completing sacred work in testament to G-d. Supporting Tikvat Israel through your vision and volunteering is part of that sacred work. But also part of the sacred work is avoiding pitfalls, such as anonymously criticizing leadership to your friends or blaming others for projects that might have succeeded with just a few more hands.

Like Queen Esther, Moses and even King Saul answered the call when asked, you can join a committee, run for a seat on the governing board or even serve as an officer. Be a king, a queen or a prophet in your own Tikvat Israel community. We'll make a space for you at the table.



Michele Eisenberg Leaves Legacy of Light and Torah

Many people leave memories when they pass away, but few leave concrete gifts that are visible every day and permanently enhance a synagogue, as Michele Eisenberg, z"l, did. In her will, Michele directed her estate to donate \$110,000 to Tikvat Israel, with special instructions for some of that money to go to the installation of new lighting in the sanctuary and on the bima.

In addition to the lighting, Michele, who died on Oct. 5, 2022, provided \$36,000 to go to the Capital Campaign and for \$45,000 to be contributed to the Fund for the Future for an annual *Shabbat Kiddush* dedicated to her memory.



As Rabbi Marc Israel noted in his eulogy at her funeral: "Throughout her life she developed an inner strength, one which she needed to draw upon and expand when Steve died five years ago, also at this time of year. This was a seismic loss, one from which she never fully recovered, but as a rock, she was shaken but not broken. And she then became a rock for so many others."

Michele and Steve "found one another and built a beautiful and loving marriage together," Rabbi Israel said. "They lived in their home for 35 years and developed many deep friendships, so many of whom are here today," he added.

Michele's concern about the lighting in the sanctuary stemmed from her role reading *Torah* on a regular basis. "Michele served as a long-time member of the *Yad Squad* — as one of four volunteers who assign weekly *Shabbat Torah* readings for three months and one festival each calendar year," Susan Apter recalls.

"Prior to the lighting getting fixed, *Torah* readers experienced issues with the Hebrew letters appearing 'shiny' or with glare that made the words difficult to read unless one was positioned directly over the words themselves. This was particularly troublesome for shorter readers," she adds. "One would need to pull out one of the boxes stored beneath the *shulchan* [to stand on]."

"The new lighting has been wonderful—no squinting at the letters or excessive leaning over the *Torah* scroll—very crisp and clear! A few months ago, I was talking to a fellow *Torah* reader about the lighting improvements, and she remarked she wished Michele would have had the opportunity to enjoy it. We are grateful for her 'pay it forward' gift," Apter says.

Jason Schwartz remembers that Michele "was instrumental in ensuring that we had volunteers signed up to help our community

fulfill the important *mitzvah* of publicly reading the *Torah*."

He also notes the problems with lighting on the *bima*. "I believe some attempts were made to correct the issue by adjusting the lights, but nothing truly solved it. Michele's generous bequest to fully replace the sanctuary lighting has made a world of difference," Schwartz adds.

"The new LED fixtures over the *bima* provide light that is bright and diffuse with no glare, enabling *Torah* readers to see the text clearly. Congregants seated in the sanctuary also benefit from the more even lighting, which minimizes shadows and provides a much more pleasant experience

following along in the prayer book or *chumash*," Schwartz says.

The speaker at our special *Shabbat* service was Shira Zemel, who is from the National Council of Jewish Women. She gave an enlightening and inspirational talk about reproductive rights and abortion access.

Our *Purim Mishloach Manot* program was also a big hit. Each congregant received a bag, and in return, we were rewarded with their heartfelt appreciation. We also enjoyed our in-person book discussion of *The Postcard* by Anne Berest, which was led by Beth Smith. Thank you to all our volunteers who made our spring programs so successful. We couldn't hold these events without you.

Turning to May and June, Women's Network has a calendar full of events. We hope you can join us as we round off the year's programs and plan for future activities.

On Sunday, May 5, at 10:30 a.m., there will be a *Rosh Chodesh* learning program led by Rabbah Arlene Berger. This session will focus on *midrashim* written by women. Reading these women's *midrashim* allows us to connect with their thoughts from a feminine perspective. We also will explore how they differ from the *midrashim* written by men. This session's topic fits into the Women's League for Conservative Judaism's Torah Fund theme of "*Kol Yisrael Arevim Zeh Ba'zeh*," meaning "All the people of Israel are responsible for one another." As Jews, one of the ways that we understand the world and each other is through examining sacred text, and then applying what we've learned to our lives through our actions.

On Sunday, May 19, the Women's League Seaboard Region Spring Conference and Installation ceremony will be held at Congregation Har Shalom in Potomac from 9 a.m. – 4 p.m. It also will be available on Zoom. In the morning, the topic of "Caring for Ourselves and Our Community" will be presented from various approaches by women who are experts in their fields. In the afternoon, there will be *Torah* study and a *Minchah* service, followed by the installation of new Seaboard Region officers. Our last May program is on Thursday the 23^{rd} —a guided tour of the Capital Jewish Museum in Washington, D.C. There will be a one-hour building tour at 11:30 a.m., followed by a 30-minute tour of the special exhibit "I'll Have What She's Having: The Jewish Deli." This book is a richly colored memoir that follows the exploits of a flamboyant Jewish family, from its bold arrival in cosmopolitan Alexandria to its defeated exodus three generations later. In an elegant and witty way, the author introduces readers to the marvelous eccentrics

who shaped his life. We get to know the boy who does not want to be led out of Egypt forever, even as he longs for a wider world.

Also planned for June (date to be determined), the Women's Network will meet in person to discuss activities for our next program year, which will start in the fall. Check your weekly e-mails for the date and location, and bring your ideas for future events to the meeting.

Lastly, we have a date for our annual "Take Me Out to the Ballgame" at the Nationals Park. Mark your calendar for Sunday, July 21, at 1:35 p.m., for a game between the Washington Nationals and Cincinnati Reds. You don't want to miss this funfilled day! (See page 2 for details.)

The inspiration for this gathering was the organization At The Well, a D.C.-based group that started promoting Rosh Chodesh Well Circles in 2015 and transitioned to leading virtual online Global Well Circles, which are available online every month. The outline usually includes candle lighting with a stated intention or blessing, a time of journaling, a guided meditation and some text study.

- A Celebration of Judaism in Art by Irene Korn. The book explains how Jewish traditions, laws and customs have produced a wealth of functional art.
- *Dora Holzhandler* by Philip Vann. This work traces the main events of Holzhandler's life and explores important themes in her paintings.
- The Emergence of Jewish Artists in Nineteenth Century Europe by Susan Tumarkin Goodman. The book explores every aspect of the role of Jewish artists within 19th-century European art.
- The Jerusalem Windows by Marc Chagall. This work showcases Chagall's magnificent stained-glass windows symbolizing the 12 ancient tribes of Israel.
- *Jewish Art* by Grace Cohen Grossman. The book presents a sweeping panorama of 3,000 years of artistic creativity.
- Jewish Art Masterpieces from the Israel Museum by Iris Fishof.
 This work highlights some of the Israel Museum's finest works.

- *Jewish Experience in the Art of the Twentieth Century* by Avram Kampf. The book includes artists and artwork that illustrate being Jewish in the 20th century.
- Moments in Jewish Life: The Folk Art of Malcah Zeldis by Yona Zeldis McDonough. This work presents a visual journey through the traditions and rituals of Jewish life.





To access the directory, log in to your ShulCloud account (https://tikvatisraelrockvillle. shulcloud.com) using your e-mail address and password or Google sign-in.
