Shul's \$1.6M Budget Carries Reserve Funds

Members of the congregation approved a \$1.57 million spending plan for 2017-18 at a congregational meeting on June 28.

The new budget, which governs shul operations from July 1 through next June 30, calls for no significant changes in spending and no increase in membership dues. It is slightly smaller than TI's annual budget for the fiscal year that concluded June 30.

The largest expense relates to the staffing and operations of the synagogue's early childhood education program, at \$605,000. The ECC also represents the largest source of expected revenue at \$750,000, based on 56 enrolled students, in 2017-18. Tuition for ECC students is being increased 4 percent.

The new budget also provides TI staff members for the first time with partial coverage of health insurance, if they do not have a spouse who already covers their health care **continued on page 2**

premiums. The budget also provides a small increase in compensation to the rabbi to reflect his expanded duties owing to the cantor's half-time role beginning in July.

Membership dues constitute nearly one-third of expected synagogue revenue in the adopted budget. Fund-raising is counted on to contribute another \$108,000, although no cantor's concert is planned.

Notably, the FY '18 budget includes \$100,000 in contingency funding to cover building emergency needs. The surplus was generated by the efficient operations of the ECC during the past 12 months.

Treasurer Stuart Lempert told the quorum of congregants (36 members minimum) that he considered the new spending plan a realistic operating budget.

Synagogue Members Backing Afghan Refugee Family

Tikvat Israel members have committed to support a refugee family from Afghanistan that has settled into a home in Landover, Md.

A synagogue contingent, coordinated by Debbie Amster and Judy Davis, has solicited various household items for use by the family, which consists of two parents, who are 28 and 29 years old, and their five young children, ranging in age from 2 through 10.

As of mid-June, the TI coordinators were seeking the following items: audio books, bicycles, children's dishes and toys.

Amster and Davis also were developing leads for the father for jobs in construction, landscaping, factory work or manual labor. The father previously was employed by the U.S. military forces in Afghanistan in construction and electrical work. His English language skills are good, and he is adept at taking

public transportation. He drives and is obtaining a U.S. driver's license. He has documentation that allows him to work.

TI's support for the Afghan family is managed through a volunteer program called First Friends, run by the Ethiopian Community Development Council. The goal of First Friends is to enable and empower refugee families, most of whom have been resettled in apartments in Cheverly, Riverdale and Landover in Prince George's County. There is no financial commitment by the shul.

The council is settling refugee families from Eritrea, Afghanistan, Iran, Iraq, Syria and the Congo.

Lobby Upgrade Expected in Late Fall

The main lobby at Tikvat Israel will receive a spiffy new look later this year. Renovation is expected to take place during the final quarter of 2017.

Board member Alan Apter chairs the committee overseeing the project. The funds will come from the final portion of a facility improvements bank loan that has addressed other structural and environmental needs during the past year, including improved light-

ing and replacement carpeting in the sanctuary and roof repairs.

The lobby renovations are expected to include new flooring and carpeting, a reconfigured coat room, new furniture, improved signage and better efficiency as an event space.

The work, once scheduled, is likely to take one to two weeks, Apter said. Design work is underway.

Volunteers to Assume More Prominent Chanting Role

Congregants will be taking more regular turns in helping to lead Shabbat morning services now that Cantor Rochelle Helzner has moved to a half-time schedule at Tikvat Israel.

The Religious Practices Committee, chaired by Susan Apter, is lining up volunteers to assist with bimah chanting duties generally two times during each month.

The cantor's new schedule, which takes effect July 1, stipulates she will serve half-time during the fiscal year that runs until June 30, 2018. This is the final year of a three-year

contract that took effect in 2015.

In addition to leading congregational services on two Shabbat mornings each month, the cantor also will oversee one Friday night service a month (including occasional Kabbalat Shabbat with Instruments), holiday services and High Holidays.

The cantor also will officiate at b'nai mitzvah as well as funerals and weddings in the Washington metropolitan area, subject to her availability, when requested by Tikvat Israel members in good standing.

On May 7, the synagogue's board of directors conducted a mini-retreat with the professional staff, committee chairs and several other lay leaders of the congregation. The purpose was to develop a theme for programming for the next year.

Serving as facilitators for the retreat were Jim Perlmutter and Rabbi Shull. Several exercises were completed as a whole group and then we broke into smaller groups to flesh out specific program ideas. The programmatic theme, agreed upon by all, was religion and science. By the end of the summer, we are hoping to finish the upgrade of the lobby. In July, there will be a thorough cleaning and reorganization of the kitchen. Certainly you will hear more about these projects as they get underway. Congregants should anticipate kiddushim following Shabbat morning services will consist of just wine, grape juice and cookies, at least during July.

Melton Class Favorites Cited at Final Session

About 15 participants in the Florence Melton School of Jewish Learning gathered on June 6 for a *siyum* to mark the completion of year 1 of the Melton program hosted by Tikvat Israel.

Each participant was asked to choose her or his favorite Melton text, present it to the class and explain the reason for the choice.

A *siyum*, the completion of any unit of Torah, or book of the Mishnah or Talmud, is usually followed by a celebratory meal. For the Melton siyum, classmates celebrated with tasty snacks.

Year 2 of the Melton curriculum – consisting of courses titled "Crossroads of Jewish History" and "Ethics of Jewish Living" – will be taught again by Rabbi Ben Shull of TI and Rabbi Uri Topolosky of Beth Joshua Congregation. Each course has 25 classes, all taught on weeknights.

Rep. Raskin Faces Supportive Crowd at TI

Maryland Congressman Jamie Raskin (D-8th) faced a sanctuary full of friendly faces at Tikvat Israel on May 8.

During an hour-long town hall that contrasted markedly in tenor and volume from congressional town hall meetings elsewhere across the country during the spring, Raskin talked about the essential role played by the U.S. Constitution in today's political environment of considerable upheaval. He also fielded an array of questions, many of them dealing with the previous week's action by the House of Representatives to repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act.

Raskin promised that he or his staff would respond to the several other questions submitted on index cards by audience members, and several congregants reported hearing from Raskin in the days following.

Prior to the presentation, Rabbi Ben Shull gave the congressman a framed photograph from his trip with congregants to a Holocaust memorial project in Whitwell, Tenn. and civil rights sites in the South.

Raskin's appearance was arranged by the synagogue's Adult Education Committee chair Sally Kram.

Minyan Matters

My dad *z"l* passed away earlier this year. Following the 30-day *Shloshim* period, I wasn't ready to stop saying *kaddish* so I made a commitment to myself to continue attending minyan every day for 11 months.

That was out of my usual comfort zone because I was not a regular synagogue goer. It was a personal decision, not one that I discussed in advance with anyone. It was just the right thing for me. I believed my dad would be proud of my decision but wouldn't have wanted to impose on my life in that way.

I have found that coming to a daily minyan is like coming to a support group. You see and talk to the same people, day-in and day-out. In just a few months I have met congregants that I never knew, even though I have belonged to Tikvat Israel for more than 30 years. They have become new friends. I enjoy spending a few minutes with them every day. I also have found that those few minutes are very calming. Whether I am at a

morning minyan or an evening minyan, I find I can relax, take a deep breath and enjoy a few minutes to just think about my life, my dad, my family and my community.

Unfortunately, there are obstacles to this commitment. The biggest hurdle is finding a minyan every day. Many mornings and evenings when I arrived at TI, fewer than 10 people were present. How frustrating for me and others who had a yahrzeit or had come to say *kaddish*. On occasion, I have had to make a quick decision: Do I depart for another area synagogue where I know there will be a minyan, or do I accept the fact that I tried and it was out of my control that I couldn't say *kaddish* that day?

Minyan is an important part of synagogue life. I hope that Tikvat Israel members will continue to support it and ensure there is a minyan for those who need it ... and that after my 11 months of saying *kaddish*, that I will be there for the next person.

Remember Us

I recently attended a presentation on charitable giving and was surprised by something I learned there.

While American Jews are among the most philanthropic groups in the country, only a small number of them include their own synagogue in their estate planning.

It's not that they don't include various other charities in their wills. They do. They just don't mention their synagogues.

They include universities, medical research associations and even other Jewish organizations. But not their synagogue.

There may be many reasons for this. One reason given by the speaker at this program is the perception that the synagogue does not have a mechanism for receiving such

gifts. Where will the money go? How will it be used? Will it get used up paying for everyday things?

At Tikvat Israel, we actually have an answer for these questions. It is the Tikvat Israel Fund for the Future. The fund was created specifically to accept and administer gifts that come from the estates of members either through wills or as the beneficiary of retirement funds such as IRAs, life insurance policies or annuities.

CALLING SPORTY TYPES

Tikvat Israel fields recreational teams in men's basketball (January-March) and men's softball (April-June) in a county-wide synagogue league. These teams always are ready to accept new members who have some connection to the shul. Gifts designated by the donor for the Fund for the Future are held in a separate, professionally managed account. A portion of the total earnings can be distributed each year toward the synagogue's expenses or for specific purposes.

Another thing I learned at this presentation is the vital role that endowments such as the Fund will play in the future to support synagogues. By one estimate, 20 percent of synagogues' annual budgets will have to come from endowments in a few years.

Without such support, the needed increase in annual dues for individual members will become an almost unsustainable burden. We have a long way to go before the Fund can contribute that much to Tikvat Israel, but we are on the way.

You can help. All we ask now is that you remember us.

Remember Tikvat Israel as part of your estate planning. Even leaving just a small share of your estate to the congregation through the fund will bring us closer to our goal.

That's all it takes. Just remember us.

Tallitot Carry Personal Meaning, Plus Vivid Colors, for Our Congregants

Tikvat Israel is a colorful congregation to behold on Shabbat and festival mornings, thanks to the many beautiful handmade tallitot crafted by Shirley Waxman. As part of our Shavuot celebrations, nearly 40 congregants gathered in the social hall following evening services May 30 to admire each other's tallit and to share the verses and adornments each has chosen as the *atarah*, or tallit collar.

Each tallit was stunning, and you can marvel at the full spread of photographs (in color) on Tikvat Israel's website photo gallery.

Some congregants selected a meaningful verse from the Torah, and others drew on a historical reference for their *atarah*.

Psalm 92:2 adorns Cantor Joel Bressler's *atarah*. *Tov l'hodot* declares it is good to give thanks and "sing Your Name, Oh Most High" – fitting for a musician. But what makes his *atarah* all the more special is that in each word at least one letter has been embroidered to look like a musical instrument – drums, horns and even a saxophone.

Marc Pressman, a longtime congregant, and Eli Liebenson, 13, discovered their atarot were embroidered with same famous Zionist quote uttered by Theodor Herzl: "Im tirtzu, ein zo agada." ("If you will it, it is no dream.")

For some congregants, it was not the design of the tallitot that meant the most to them, but rather the memories associated with the garments. Dan and Amy Matathias wore the tallitot that were

made for their children. Dan said he cherishes the memory of the *tallitot* production process, specifically getting to see his children express themselves through color and style. He hopes the *tallitot* will remind his children of those special family bonding moments.

Similarly, Felicia Black said she feels close to her son when she wears the *tallit* he designed when he became a bar mitzvah. The *atarah* is emblazoned with the famous Rabbi Hillel quote: "If I am not for myself, who is for me? And when I am for myself, what am I? And if not now, when?"

The feeling of family connection was a theme whose thread ran across several congregants' *tallitot* collars that didn't have words but rather symbols. Connected circles represents "l'dor vador" ("from generation to generation"), explained Waxman, an accomplished fiber artist who estimates she has designed and stitched at least 100 Tikvat Israel members' *tallitot* over the past 30 years.


She learned the embroidery technique from Jewish Yemenite women in Israel, who don't make a single stitch that is not imbued with purpose and meaning.

Bonus: Have you ever wondered why clergy have an extra stripe on the back of their tallitot? Cantor Helzner explained (and Rabbi Shull and Rabbah Arlene Berger confirmed this) that Waxman had told her that since the clergy spend so much time with their backs turned, the congregation should have something nice to view!

Shirley Waxman can take credit for many of the tallitot worn by members of the congregation, and she also can claim to have created the tallit for the first girl to wear a tallit at our synagogue when it was known as Beth Tikva. She has forgotten the name of the bat mitzvah and estimates this occurred about 30 years ago.

"I remember she agonized over it," Shirley recalled recently. "It was a momentous decision. There was not a law (requiring a girl to wear a *tallit*) then. She decided she wanted to do this so I put everyone on hold and got hers done on time. She was a lovely kid, brave to be the first."

Members of Tikvat Israel traveled to Whitwell, Tenn., site of the film documentary "Paper Clips," to commemorate Yom HaShoah in late April, then played host to three students and a teacher from the Tennessee middle school who visited the D.C. area one month later.

Seventy members of TI and Congregation Beth Joshua, an Orthodox shul in Rockville, welcomed the student ambassadors of the Whitwell Middle School's Holocaust program and their teacher during a 3½-day visit in late May that included a welcome reception in the TI social hall. A brief clip from "Paper Clips" was viewed before the students talked about what they had learned at their school about the Shoah.

The Whitwell contingent took a Capitol tour, met with Sen. Robert Corker (R-Tenn.) and Rep. Jamie Raskin (D-Md.), visited the Holocaust Memorial Museum and the memorials on

Hasbara: A Focus on Israeli Innovation

(SECOND IN A CONTINUING SERIES)

In the May-June issue of the Tikvat Israel Bulletin, I introduced this series of columns on Hasbara with some background, explaining that we will be focusing on various aspects of Israeli innovations as we prepare to celebrate the State of Israel's 70th anniversary next spring. In that issue, I shared some interesting health-related information on an Israeli salt-substitute product that contains significantly less sodium than regular table salt.

Hasbara, as I explained, represents public affairs communications in the media about the bipartisan U.S. relationship with Israel and information we as a congregation need to share with the wider American community.

I have found a wealth of other innovations to share in this and future columns. In this issue, due to space limitations, I will cover two that I consider the most fascinating and relevant.

The first deals with research at Ben-Gurion University of the Negev (BGU) involving a new biomedical polymer that has proven effective with heart disease. In fact, it is able to cause measurable reductions in plaque buildup in the arteries of test animals as well as a decrease in inflamed areas within the cardiovascular system.

It's no secret that atherosclerosis cardiovascular disease is deadly. The Global Burden of Disease Report (Lancet, 2015) indicates more than 50 million deaths occur annually as a result

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of this disease. Damage (due to high cholesterol, smoking and/ or high blood pressure) to the endothelium, which is a thin layer of cells in the arteries, results in the formation of plaque. This is worsened by the body's sending of white blood cells to the affected areas, causing plaque accumulation.

Professor Ayelet David of the university's Department of Clinical Biochemistry and Pharmacology said the new polymer "reduces plaque and prevents further plaque progression and inflammation, preventing arterial thrombosis, ischemia, myocardial infarction and stroke." According to an article in May by Shoshanna Solomon in The Times of Israel (www.timesofisrael. com), the polymer "reverses arterial damage and improves the heart muscle." No other known therapy can do that.

Further, the polymer does not appear to cause any damage to healthy tissues and there is no known side effect. BGN Technologies (Ben-Gurion University's company focusing on commercialization of technology) is, according to Dr. Ora Horovitz, "seeking a pharmaceutical company to bring our polymer therapy through the next stages of drug development and ultimately to market." Right now, there is reason to believe that this new technology may prove better than statins in the treatment of large numbers of today's patients.

I want to share a second example of new technology. Proper posture is important to everyone because the slumping manner in which many of us walk and sit can cause serious physical problems over time, certainly including major back pain. An Israeli product, Upright, is awaiting FDA approval. Clinical trials are in progress both in the United States and in Israel. As reported in the May 2017 issue of World Jewish Digest, it is "a unique posture trainer which invisibly attaches to your lower back under your shirt and corrects you when you are not standing or sitting upright. Every time you slouch, it gently vibrates, reminding you to correct your posture."

The cost of the product is approximately \$130, and that price includes a mobile app that tracks a patient's progress and even has the capability to add customizable posture-training programs. The way the device notifies the user of improper posture is with a gentle electrical pulse involving a mild vibration, the intensity of which can be adjusted by the user. Further, there is a chat feature that allows the patient to confer with a physical therapist in real

Hazak Hears From Expert on Diversity



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
