Congregants Adopt \$2.3M Budget In a Year of Likely Uncertainty

Congregants ratified their board of directors' \$2.3 million operating budget for a new fiscal year that the board's financial managers said would be marked by uncertainty owing mostly to outside forces.

The decisive vote, 48-0 in favor of adoption with four abstentions, was taken at a congregational meeting in the Tikvat Israel social hall on June 29. Seven of the participants voted remotely.

The budget assumes the synagogue will bring in \$1.2 million in revenue from the Broadman-Kaplan Early Childhood Center and \$675,000 in membership dues. The biggest expenses are expected to be \$980,000 in ECC operations, \$449,000 in buildings and grounds costs, \$370,000 in administrative expenses and \$250,000 toward clergy, including part-time cantorial services.

The \$2.3 million budget, which took effect on July 1, is about \$80,000 less than the congregation's budget approved one year prior.

Treasurer Barry Lipsy and financial secretary Ira Benzion said hard choices were needed to create a balanced budget. The new budget forgoes paying down the synagogue's mortgage and set-asides to build up funds for facility repairs and eventual roof replacement.

They said congregants ought to be prepared for fiscal challenges in the coming year, owing to the uncertainty over federal grants to houses of worship and the likelihood of higher inflationary costs for building maintenance and food costs. Additionally, the ECC is reporting its enrollment down by 10 children heading into the new school year, resulting in a potential loss of \$140,000 in revenue.

Fund Investments Add \$37K to TI Revenues

The synagogue's long-range endowment, the Fund for the Future, is expected to contribute \$37,200 to Tikvat Israel's operating revenue in FY '26, according to Larry Gorban, the fund's board president.

In his annual report at the congregational meeting June 29, Gorban said the fund's total balance has increased from \$832,940 to \$883,756 over a 16-month period ending April 30.

Since its founding in 2012, the Fund for the Future has distributed nearly \$111,000 in earnings. Fund performance depends on stock market performance. The money is invested with the Jewish Community Foundation.

Three individuals begin terms in July on the nine-member FFF board. Rebecca Salon is joining, while Gorban and Aaron Fineman have agreed to serve second three-year terms.

Black) Also, the approved congregational budget calls for a fund-raising event to bring in far less than the record \$150,000 to \$175,000 tied to the retirement tribute for Cantor Emeritus Rochelle Helzner this past May.

"Our goal is to be financially stable not just today but into the future," Lipsy said in his report.

TI likely will end FY '25 with a modest balance owing to the record haul from the concert, along with a \$144,000 grant from the Temple Israel Foundation and a new money market account that generated \$7,800 in interest, according to the treasurer.

In his executive director's report to the congregation, Aaron Chusid said the first round of voluntary dues pledges for FY '26 were promising. In the first year of the voluntary membership dues model, about 47 percent contributed more than the suggest amount.

RABBI'S CORNER My Forthcoming Sabbatical

The last few months have been a roller coaster of emotions. The world is changing quickly in unpredictable and potentially dangerous ways.

As I write this, Israel is attacking Iran to destroy its nuclear capabilities. Iran is launching missiles at Israeli population centers. Most have been intercepted, several have not, killing dozens of Israeli civilians and injuring hundreds more. We don't know if the U.S. will enter the

war or the ramifications of that decision. When you read this, we will likely know more, but the only thing I feel safe predicting is whatever the situation, most of us will still be feeling a great deal of anxiety.

In the Tikvat Israel microcosm, these last two months have given us much to celebrate and much to mourn. We held our congregational *Pesach seder*, participated in a community *Yom HaAtzmaut* celebration and *Yom HaShoah* commemoration, held our record-breaking concert with Joey Weisenberg to honor Cantor Rochelle Helzner, had a reception to express our appreciation to our donors, began studying *Mishnah Shabbat* at Friday weekly study sessions, concluded our Tuesday morning weekly discussions with Kehilat Pardes on "Judaism is About Love" and hosted Ambassador Dan Shapiro in relaunching the Men's Club. And we have done our best to smile through our tears as Cantor Helzner now has transitioned to cantor emeritus.

We also held numerous lifecycle celebrations, including a baby-naming and an *aufruf*, and we provided condolence to the six families who lost loved ones during the past seven weeks.

In addition to the situation in Iran, we in the Jewish community have been traumatized by the continued hostage situation, the war in Gaza and the harm it inflicts, an attack on a Jewish governor's home on *seder* night, the murder of two employees of the Israeli embassy outside the Capital Jewish Museum, the firebombing of a weekly march on behalf of the hostages in Boulder, Colo., and many more incidents. And, as Americans, many of us have been distraught by members of our community and our loved ones losing their jobs, by neighbors being deported, by an unprecedented use of active-duty military troops to quell domestic protests and by our government's dismantling systems of scientific research and attacking our academic institutions.

It's a lot.

Often, members of our congregation kindly check in with me to see how I'm holding up. My usual response is to deflect and note that we all deal with these issues and that there are many whose circumstances are far worse than mine. Those are both true. However, when I'm being honest, as much as I love my job, it does take a physical, mental and spiritual toll on me, probably more than I recognize. This is why I'm so grateful for the opportunity to take a sabbatical this summer.

As you know, the word and the concept of sabbatical is related to *Shabbat* – not just rest, but a time when we set aside our regular

activities to create space and participate in activities that lift us up spiritually and allow us to reflect on the big picture of our lives.

While I'm away, I hope to spend two weeks studying at the Shalom Hartman Institute in Jerusalem as part of their Rabbinic Torah Seminar. (As of this writing, if Israel's air space reopens, the program will run.) This seminar involves intensive study of Jewish text and the application of these to the modern world. We also spend time with experts in Israel and Diaspora Jewry, learning to better understand today's Jewish world.

When I return, I will go to Camp Ramah in New England for 10 days to be the in-house adviser for the vocational education program for adults with disabilities working at the camp.

Neither of these experiences will be "restful" in the usual sense of the word. However, I expect both will be energizing and help me return a better rabbi and more equipped to take on the challenges in the year to come. And, not to worry, I will have a more traditional family vacation at the end.

During this time, please contact Aaron Chusid or the office for any urgent matters – they will always be able to reach me. In addition, Rabbah Arlene Berger and Rabbi David Abramson, both known to many members of our community, will be available in case of an emergency that requires a rabbi to be in person. For non-urgent matters, I will respond to e-mails or calls upon return.

Even as I eagerly anticipate my time away, I also look forward to the year ahead and the work that lies in front of us. This coming year is an extremely important one for TI as we make consequential decisions impacting the future of our community. I suspect this process, along with the regular challenges we face, will require our full energy bank. This is why I am so grateful to the congregation for providing me with this opportunity to restore and rebuild my own resources. I anticipate returning at full strength, ready to help guide us through the days and months, the joys and the challenges that lie ahead.

I pray these coming months will bring you health and joy, and I pray our world will become a less anxiety-inducing, more stable and more peaceful place.

Record Participation and Revenue Mark Our Farewell to Our Beloved Cantor

Tikvat Israel Congregation commemorated Cantor Rochelle Helzner's transition to cantor emeritus with two special events in May.

We celebrated the cantor and her 41 years of service at a gala concert at the Robert E. Parilla Performing Arts Center in Rockville, featuring Joey Weisenberg and the Rising Song Ensemble. The cantor is a long-time fan of this music and has brought many of Weisenberg's *niggunim* to the religious services she led at TI.

The annual cantor's concert is TI's largest fundraiser of every year, and this concert was no exception. The committee raised significantly more than its goal, bringing in a gross of more than \$200,000. This amount is believed to be the largest total raised at a single TI-affiliated event.

The Parilla Center was the perfect venue for the concert, with room for over 500. More than 95 percent of the seats were sold. Those attending the show had ample opportunities to sing along with the musicians.

The Rising Song Ensemble included five vocalists, some of whom also played instruments, such as guitar, violin, trombone and percussion. The voices blended well and were enhanced by the instruments. Many audience members commented afterward that they couldn't believe the versatility of the drummer, who also played bass simultaneously with the drums.

Audience participation is a hallmark of Weisenberg's performances, which was fun for all. Cantor Helzner sang with the band during "Halleluyah" on stage, which delighted the audience.

Many members of Cantor Helzner's family were in attendance, including her two children, her granddaughter, her father and her in-laws. This made the event even more special for the cantor and the entire audience.

The concert was a complicated project, which required more than 55 volunteers to coordinate over the better part of a year. Synagogue members and Cantor Helzner fans took on roles large and small, from a fundraising committee, chaired by Aaron Mannes, to a publicity committee, chaired by Melissa Apter. Ushers for the event were coordinated by Jeff and Elyse Bernstein, and Rena Strauss assisted by being the primary liaison with Joey Weisenberg and the ensemble. Nancy Goldberg oversaw the creation of the beautiful program booklet, which was designed by Vivian Liebenson.

Jason Schwartz chaired the committee to create a good-natured roast of the cantor and sponsors' reception for major donors, which took place on May 29 at the synagogue. The overall chairs for the event were Jeff Smith and Mary Wagner.

On May 29, major donors were treated to an evening of fun with Cantor Helzner and friends. There was a roast, written by Fred Wagner, while Cantor Helzner sang two songs, accompanied by her sister Robyn and congregant Dan Black. Then all were treated to a fabulous reception where they could congratulate the cantor while enjoying tasty food prepared by congregants Roz Kram and Larry Gorban, with the help of many others.

These events are a farewell but not a goodbye to Cantor Helzner. She will continue to be a presence in Tikvat Israel life through planned events, including *Kabbalat Shabbat* with Instruments throughout 2025-26 and other musical programming.

She will be honored with an artistic glass sculpture created by congregant Tamah Graber, which will be installed later this year in the front garden, commemorating her 41 years of service to the congregation.

CO-PRESIDENTS' CORNER Our Roadmap to the Future: Where Are We?

In June 2022, when we adopted our current strategic plan, we were just coming out of the worst of the pandemic. We were dealing with a lot of unknowns, but one thing was certain. We had to make changes and adopt this plan to secure our future.

In the first year we accomplished a lot. We updated communication methods, introduced leadership workshops, increased programming for young families, added events for Jewish life and holiday experiences, improved transparency for

finances and policies, and added new accessibility measures.

To highlight just a few of the actions we took in Year 1:

- our new website improved communications and showed our support for a diverse community;
- we welcomed new board members after increasing transparency of roles, and utilized USCJ resources to hold a one-day leadership retreat;
- we added Young Family Shabbat Dinners and built Netivot to include more young families;
- we strengthened our community with quarterly Shabbat dinners and more robust kiddushes;
- we developed new rental policies to cover security needs and staff support, which assisted our search for new sources of non-dues revenue;
- we established clear guidelines for interfaith families;
- we updated membership forms to be technology-friendly and easily understood by younger generations;
- we added a new sound system in the sanctuary to improve accessibility; and
- we began using name tags to improve community-building.

In addition, the Capital Campaign successfully raised funds to pay for much-needed repairs.

The second year continued all the work of the first, but the most significant accomplishment was the extensive work done to implement the voluntary pledge model, adopted at the June 2023 congregational meeting. Transparency, Inclusiveness, and Professionalism became the guiding pillars for the Board.

We entered the third year of our strategic plan with an amazing response to our voluntary pledge model, bringing in significantly more funds than we had previously with dues. Because we made entry to congregational life financially accessible to younger members, we attracted 24 new households, more than double our increases in past years, including an increasing number of families with young children. For us, one of the most startling occurrences happened at a *kiddush* in the early spring when we realized that we had to buy highchairs. What a wonderful surprise!

During this third year of the strategic plan, we have increased our work towards making Jewish life accessible and meaningful for all parts of our community. Work has begun to develop assistive materials for less traditionally knowledgeable members and their families to experience services. We have introduced new opportunities for Jewish spirituality and supported or added nonprayer-focused holiday celebrations. Through SEA Change, we've made connections with community organizations on activities and initiatives that are meaningful, aligned with Jewish values, and accessible for congregants. And we've been able to provide a variety of tasty and interesting foods at both sponsored and unsponsored *kiddushes*.

But among all of these wonderful accomplishments, we have been dealing with one particular challenge. Although our strategic plan clearly outlines how volunteers are to plan and execute projects and events, there has been resistance to one change in particular filling out forms. While this isn't as much fun as preparing meals at a shelter or planning an event to honor a member of our community, it IS necessary if we are going to secure the future of our community. Help with the forms is available if needed! Planning for the future requires that we be mindful of costs with predetermined budgets and keep complete records, so we don't have to reinvent the wheel when new volunteers take over.

As we prepare to enter the fourth year on our Road to the Future, let's continue to work together to make Tikvat Israel, our *kehillah*, a stronger forward-thinking community ready to Engage, Embrace, Inspire, and Empower our Jewish Community.

We Were Immigrants, Too

Leviticus 19:33-34 states: "The stranger who resides with you shall be to you as one of your citizens; you shall love him as yourself, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt."

As American Jews, most of us inherited a family legacy of the

immigrant or refugee experience. Our history is one of countless chapters of resettlement after expulsion, oppression, hardship and intolerance that led our ancestors to seek new lands.

Today, as before, those who have fled the perils of their homelands look to America as their hope for safe haven. But the current inhumanity and unprecedented escalation in deportation of immigrants and refugees since Trump took office (over 65,000 reported by early June) leave us outraged, overwhelmed and feeling inadequate to protect neighbors who are a vital part of our community. There has never been a more urgent need for us to speak up, speak out and ally with the vulnerable.

TI's SEA Change (Study, Engage, Act, Change) group links TI members with opportunities to transform our concerns into action to make change. Through our community partners, you can:

- Participate in "Know Your Rights" canvasses (speaking a second language can be helpful, but not required);
- Train to accompany migrants to ICE/ISAP check-ins and court hearings through the Episcopal Diocese of Washington, District Action Network and Congregation Action Network;
- Complete "Know Your Rights" and Immigration Enforcement Bystander Training (run by CASA) in-person or online;
- Find opportunities for attorneys (immigration law experience not required) to assist with immigration proceedings through CASA and to volunteer as mentors and language partners through HIAS; and
- Join Jews United for Justice Montgomery County Racial Equity and Policing Team meetings (including local immigration issues), usually held on the second Tuesday of the month, online at 7 p.m. ET.

Advance Purchase of a Burial Plot Benefits Your Synagogue

One reason people join synagogues is for the support and comfort offered when a loved one dies. Tikvat Israel has a strong history of helping members and their families at a time of loss.

One way we help is by buying burial plots at discounted prices at two cemeteries and then by selling those plots to congregants at prices below market rates. At Judean Memorial Gardens in Olney, we currently have five plots available for sale in the TI section, and at Garden of Remembrance in Clarksburg, we have 14 plots available for sale in the TI section.

Until Aug. 31, we are offering our current inventory of plots at either cemetery for \$2,450 each, which is a significant discount compared to an individual contracting directly with either cemetery. This price has not changed for several years. Effective Sept. 1, these prices will increase by \$500 with plots at both cemeteries costing \$2,950.

Here are a few reasons to consider buying a burial plot now:

- **Saves money for families.** Costs increase over time due to inflation. By buying now, you can lock in the costs.
- Less burden for surviving family members. When preplanning, a person can outline her or his preferences, leaving little to no guesswork for family members. In addition, when mourning, one of the last things the mourners want to deal with is the cemetery and selecting and paying for the burial plot.
- **Personalize a final resting place.** Just like selecting a dream home, pre-need planning allows customers to select their dream resting place—near or under a tree, beside their beloved spouse or near cherished friends or relatives.
- **Provides cash for the synagogue.** TI purchased these burial plots as a service to its members and already has paid for them. When you buy one of these burial plots from TI, you help us recoup our investment.
