Acclaimed A Cappella Troop Signed for Tl's Spring Concert

Tikvat Israel's annual concert on Sunday, May 31, will feature the nationally known *a cappella* group, Six13. The performance will take place in the auditorium of Richard Montgomery High School in Rockville.

Information about ticketing and sponsorship opportunities will be made public in early 2026. Roni and Bob Silverstein are serving as concert co-chairs.

Six13 is a New York–based all-male Jewish *a cappella* singing group. Formed in 2003, the six-voice group is known for parodying contemporary pop songs by adding Jewish themes and lyrics.

Juxtaposing the traditional and the contemporary, Six13 is anchored by a strong Jewish identity, fueled by soulful harmonies, intricate arrangements and their signature dynamic, full-band-like sound, and driven by a mission to connect Jews around the world with their heritage through music.

According to the band's publicity, Six13 consists of members from varied Jewish denominations and upbringings, creating an entertainment experience that has been universally acclaimed across the globe by Jewish organizations and individuals from equally varied backgrounds and generations. They have performed at the White House and the Kennedy Center. The group is slated to perform at Adas Israel in Washington, D.C., on Sunday, Dec. 14.

The concert, which will serve as the synagogue's major fund-raising activity of FY '26, is being underwritten in part by a grant from the Jewish Federation of Greater Washington.


Annual Pledge Commitment Hits Key Mark

The congregation's finances reached an important milestone in mid-October when the amount remaining in unrenewed member pledges exceeded the amount remaining to reach the operating budget's \$675,000 goal, according to Aaron Chusid, executive director.

"That means if each of the 25 remaining households renews their pledge at the same amount as last year, we will reach our goal," Chusid said in a report to the TI board of directors.

"We still have work to do to get there, but that is an excellent predictor of the success of our campaign," he added.

RABBI'S CORNER Who's Leading the Service?

Since Cantor Rochelle Helzner became our cantor emeritus and we entered this period of visioning our future, the question of who is leading our services has become a frequent topic of conversation.

Sometimes the question is quite literal: "Please tell me the name of the person who will be leading?" For the Visioning Committee, there is also a

more theoretical nature of this question: "What qualities should this person have?"

In American synagogues, there are four terms commonly used for the prayer leader: *Hazzan*, Cantor, Cantorial Soloist and *Shaliach Tzibbur*. Colloquially, they often are used interchangeably, but there are subtle and important distinctions that are helpful to understand as we consider our future.

Hazzan: Synagogue Expert

The title *Hazzan* dates back to *Mishnaic* times (2nd century CE) and referred to the person in charge of the functioning of the synagogue and teaching children. Various references in the Talmud indicate that the *Hazzan* read *Torah*, taught children to read, cared for the *Torah* scrolls and oversaw prayer services (although not necessarily leading them).

By the time of the *Shulkhan Arukh* (17th century CE), the title *Hazzan* also could refer to the person leading the service. Today, when we call someone a *Hazzan*, it emphasizes the person's expertise in chanting liturgy with the proper *nusach* (traditional musical mode), their precise knowledge of the various tropes for reading *Torah*, *Haftarah* and the *Megillot*, and their ability to lead the community musically with *kavvanah* (intention).

Shaliach Tzibbur: Communal Messenger

Technically, a *Shaliach Tzibbur* (literally "messenger of the community") is a role, not a title. Whoever is leading the congregation in prayer, regardless of training, is called the *Shaliach Tzibbur* or its acronym, the *shatz*. It is the main term used throughout rabbinic literature for a prayer leader.

While a *Hazzan* or Cantor often functions as a *Shaliach Tzibbur*, anyone who knows the service can be a *shatz*. Prior to the printing press, which made the *siddur* accessible to all, the role of *shatz* as the community messenger was quite literal: The *shatz* recited the prayers and the community responded "*amen*."

Interestingly, *Rambam* and others emphasized that a pleasant voice and knowledge of the prayers were important, but the essen-

tial qualification was that the *Shaliach Tzibbur* should be a person of strong character, who leads with humility and sincerity.

Cantor: A Professional

Over the years: In the first half of the 20th century, a great Cantor was expected to have an operatic voice and to deliver the service with grand majesty. People often came to services just to hear the Cantor sing, not expecting to sing along.

In the 1970s, the trend began to shift toward melodies and voices that encouraged participation. At the same time, the Cantor is now considered a full member of the clergy team who would officiate at life-cycle rituals and provide pastoral care.

Cantorial Soloist: A Strong Voice

In the latter half of the 20th century, a new category emerged: the Cantorial Soloist. This person is typically a gifted singer who is familiar with the liturgy but without professional schooling. A Soloist role is usually part-time and limited to leading services. This individual generally lacks a deep knowledge of the history of liturgy or the subtle intricacies of *nusach*, but people often appreciate that they sing at a level and use melodies that encourage others to participate.

These descriptions are not exact, but are meant to highlight the emphasis of each approach:

- The *Hazzan*, a trained professional with a focus on preserving the sacred musical tradition.
- The *Shaliach Tzibbur*, a prayer leader who embodies communal humility and spiritual intent.
- The **Cantor**, who brings a professional seminary education and pastoral presence.
- The **Soloist**, who is pleasant and accessible.

Of course, any individual is likely to be a composite of different aspects of these descriptions. Cantor Helzner was unusually gifted in her ability to take the best from each approach and embody it in one person.

It is important to understand these distinctions to determine how we move forward.

Hazzan Elliot Vogel, who presided over our Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services, as well as Michael Leifman and the leaders we will host over the next several months, were chosen to provide examples of the strengths of each style of leadership. We hope you will provide feedback on each one so we can determine how to best move forward.

Playing the Role of Tolkien's Elves in Our Congregation

Some of you may have heard this message at the *Kol Nidre* service. For those who did not or who may want a refresher, here is our *Yom Kippur* Appeal 2025 (delivered by Sally Kram). It's been edited for clarity and length.

I am pleased to once again present the annual ritual of the *Yom Kippur* Appeal. But I warn you—this is not your parents' *Yom Kippur* Appeal.

As promised when Tikvat Israel launched its new annual pledge model, I will not be asking you for money tonight.

Instead, I want to tell you about one of my favorite authors—J.R.R. Tolkien, author of the *Hobbit* and the *Lord of the Rings*. While Tolkien has a controversial reputation in the Jewish world, I am not here to discuss that aspect of his writing, but rather what I personally took away from his books.

Specifically, I want to talk about the Elves. Tolkien's Elves were created by the gods of his fictional world and given

unique magical talents to reform the world of Middle Earth. Elves were a gracious people, gifted with immortality. When they eventually left Middle Earth, for a time any lands the Elves lived in retained their magic. But eventually, even that magic faded away.

We, the Jewish people, are NOT like Tolkien's Elves. We will not fade away or withdraw to leave the world to fend for itself. Instead, we continue the work of *Tikkun Olam* — healing the world. The work starts right here, at Tikvat Israel. Together we can make our small corner of the community — our home shire — more "magical," continuing this *Kehillat's* vibrancy as a gathering place for prayer, thought and community.

And that is the message of the 2025 *Yom Kippur* Appeal. We want YOU to volunteer at our *shul*.

Let me give you a small sample of the kind of people who have made our *shul* a more vibrant place in the past year.

Sam Gilston has been a great force behind our *shul* for many years. He has, among other things, been a prodigious fundraiser for Tikvat Israel. Adding to his volunteer resume, this past month, Sam and another active TI member— Richard Lederman—have agreed to co-chair TI's revitalized Israel Affairs Committee. Thank you, Sam and Richard.

Roni Silverstein continues applying her skills and talents to lead *Netivot*, as well as providing input to the ECC and TI's teen programs. And, within the last month, she and her spouse Bob have agreed to chair the 2026 Spring Concert Team. More on that later.

In her spare time, she reads *haftorah* and helps in assigning other *haftorah* readers. *Todah rabah* Judi.

What would Tikvat Israel be without Warren Berger? He and his wife, Rabbah Arlene Berger, have been mainstays of our congregation for many years. In addition to his past service as co-president and then president of our congregation, he has stepped up this year to serve as co-chair of the Bylaws Committee. (I hear they are seeking new members.) A parliamentary "aye, aye" to you, Warren.

Rachel Laveer has done a mammoth job this past year seeking to make the TI trains run on time. She has helped to plan TI's events, recruit event coordinators, run the calendar, while also serving as an active member of our executive committee and board of directors in addition to her demanding full-time day job. Thank you, Rachel, for all that you do.

These members demonstrate that volunteers come in all types. We are blessed at TI with many people devoted to our congregation. That is why so many people are involved and do so many things.

On Sunday, Nov. 9, at 10:30 a.m., congregant Debby Berlyne will present a talk about her mother's experience as a child survivor of the Holocaust. Her mother left her home in Germany at the age of 8 through the Kindertransport program. The presentation will describe her early experiences of antisemitism, the wartime deprivations, and how she survived during the war while in an orphanage in Brussels, Belgium, during Nazi occupation. It is sure to be an interesting and moving presentation, which will include slides and a segment from an audio recording of Debby's mother made by the Shoah Foundation.

A book group discussion will be held on Sunday, Nov. 16, at the synagogue. The title of the book for this meeting is *The Hebrew Teacher* by Maya Arad. This book consists of three novellas, which focus on three Israeli women who immigrated to the U.S. The book describes these women, whose lives were changed as immigrants, and how they seek to overcome various crises. They confront issues related to the passage of time, how to live a useful life and how to deal with generational differences.

Turning to December, we look forward to participating in a gentle yoga class, to be taught jointly by Monya Cohen and Charlene Marie Muhammad, both of whom are instructors at the Happy Yogi Co-op housed at Tikvat Israel. Monya is familiar to our Women's Network members, as a previous presenter to our group last April when she spoke with Rachel Tamar Avigad on their volunteer experiences in Israel after Oct. 7. Monya and Charlene's yoga class for the Women's Network will be held on Sunday, Dec. 7. This session will have a special emphasis on practicing yoga with a focus on the body as a vehicle of change.

To recap some of our recent events, we held a successful membership event on Sunday, Oct. 26 featuring Rachel Braun, an embroidery artist who specializes in incorporating Jewish text in her original needlecraft designs. Her pieces are both beautiful and inspirational. We had the wonderful opportunity to see several of

the actual pieces, look at photographs of Rachel's work through her slides and learn about her beautiful artistic creations. Also during this event, our members were treated to some delicious food and enjoyed having the opportunity to schmooze with one another.

TIKVAT ISRAEL SEA CHANGE

Social Justice Issues Discussed at SEA Change Listening Sessions

Over the summer, Tikvat Israel's SEA Change members hosted three house meetings or listening sessions at the homes of congregants.

The series was designed to include a crosssection of TI's membership, so participants could freely discuss their own experiences that influenced their thinking on racial inequity and social justice.

Participants shared their experiences growing up in different parts of the country, and several described what it was like being on the receiving end of antisemitism. One member described that he had been the target of antisemitism while serving in the U.S. Navy. Another explained how her family wasn't allowed to rent a vacation home in Ocean City, Md., because they were Jewish. Most understood how their own experiences with prejudice helped them better understand how Black and Hispanic communities are affected by racial bias.

Several participants talked about their own observations of how members of minority groups are treated. One, who grew up in West Virginia, described how he saw the impact that drug addiction has on members of the Black community.

Another, who worked for a social service agency, talked about how immigrants from Central America are afraid to use the social services that are available to them because of their fear of actions by the government. She went on to describe how there is a surplus of food at area food banks because those most in need are afraid to come to those food banks to receive badly needed groceries and household products.

Prejudice is not limited to race or nationality. One of the participants, who spent her career in education, saw discrimination against the hearing-impaired students in her school.

Social Justice Issues at TI

Through our discussions, the SEA Change committee heard that inclusion and social justice issues occur within the Tikvat Israel community as well. As open and inclusive as our rabbi and cantor emeritus and congregants are, there is still room for deepening our connections with those who do not yet feel fully integrated into synagogue life and activities.

Several suggestions were made including programs to educate congregants about gender identity, same sex and interracial marriage, accessibility, and pairing up with new members and guests to help them feel welcome at services.

From these sessions, we learned there is great awareness of racial and social injustice issues in our community. Participants highlighted priority issues such as food insecurity, immigration, gender identity and disability inclusion. Many people want to take action but do not know where to go or how to start.

Fortunately, Tikvat Israel SEA Change, along with our partner organizations, participates in activities and programs designed to




address these important issues. Members of SEA Change will help anyone who wants to get involved. From letter writing to attending learning sessions or meeting with our legislators in Annapolis, there is something everyone can do to help effect changes that will make our communities better places to live for everyone.

Additional listening sessions are being planned for later in the fall. We hope everyone will take advantage of opportunities to share


